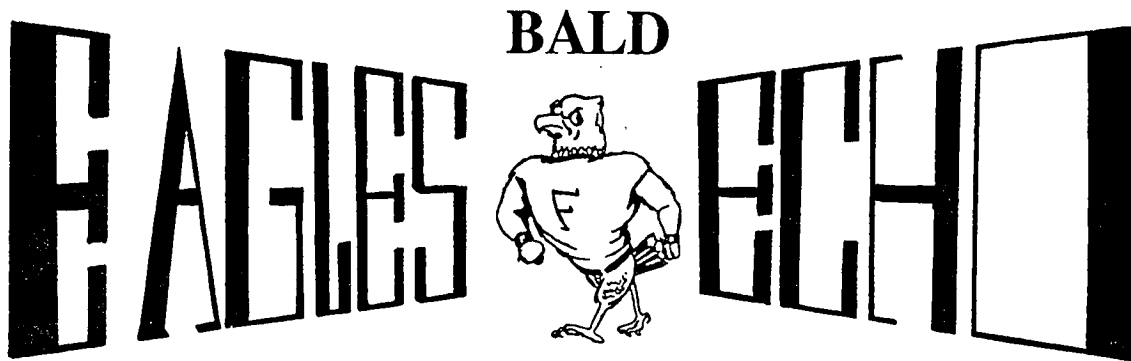

Or, as was pointed out by the reunion planner, the Postal Service is very proud of its 97% accuracy in delivery. Which means, for you math geniuses, that 3% of our mailings don't make it. Since this flyer went out to over 2,600 eager FHS alumni, approximately 75 people are still looking for that flyer! However, never fear--for your convenience we've added a copy of the registration form in the middle of this newsletter. Now you have no excuse not to make it to this reunion!

With less than four months to go, over one third of our hotel rooms have been booked, so you need to make your reservations NOW. The Hyatt Regency has a toll-free number (shown on the reservation form) which you can use, but you need to be aware that this is a nation-wide number. They won't have any information regarding our reunion. However, when you get your acknowledgment from Hyatt, it should confirm your group rate of \$62.00. Use their Denver number, 303/295-1234, if you're concerned! Or please call me with any questions. I'll get 'em answered.

The one question always asked is "what do I wear?" to the different functions. Although addressed in the reunion flyer, I thought it might bear repeating. These weekends are *really* casual; the most important thing to consider is that you're comfortable. If comfort means not dressing too out of line with everyone else, I can assure you that you'll see the whole range of attire at the reunion! However, Friday night's gathering is meant to be casual; perhaps pants/skirts for the gals, golf shirts, etc. for the guys--something slightly fancier than cut-offs will probably prevail. THINGS TO DO IN DENVER WHEN YOU'RE . . .

Warren Zevon played in Denver a few weeks ago. "Werevolves of London" is probably his most recognizable work to date, but he's got a new record out and he's showcasing it on tour. The cut receiving the most airplay is "Things To Do In Denver When You're Dead."

I heard it on the way to work the other day, and it occurred to me that many of you who are planning to attend this year's FHS Reunion may not know about or fully appreciate the tremendous cultural resources of our Dusty Old Cowtown. I thought that if you knew about what awaits you here, you would be highly motivated to come to Denver and update your customized "short-timers" calendar in anticipation of your visit. For those "on the fence" about the reunion (and you know who you are), I'm confident that this article will force your hand. For those who have no intention of coming, eat your hearts out. You will be deprived of an unparalleled educational experience. No, I don't work for the convention bureau.

Denver now has three (3) brewpubs. A brewpub, for those living in cultural wastelands that don't have any, is a place that brews different kinds of beer on the premises in smallish quantities. This assures maximum freshness, taste and quality. The difference between these custom-brewed "boutique" beers and, say, a can of Bud Light, is the difference between the Vienna Boys' Choir and an elk passing gas in the aspens. Really.

The really excellent news is that all three brewpubs are located in downtown Denver and are within easy striking distance of our headquarters hotel. This past week, I and a colleague from Texas (those who attended the San Antonio Reunion have probably tried to forget him, but can't) donated our personal free time to conduct detailed research on these three establishments for your benefit. We took notes, sampled everything, spoke with management, and did everything we could to assure ourselves that we could recommend them without reservations. We can! Actually, you don't need reservations in any of them.

You might think that having three brewpubs near each other might be a problem for the owners, with competition in all things being keen these days. Actually, a synergistic relationship seems to have developed among the three. Together, they are collectively raising beer awareness and creating a much larger market. Also, each of the three has a distinctly different personality and attracts a different clientele.

One other thing. While handmade beer is definitely the attraction of all three, high-quality, unpretentious, reasonably priced food is their bread and butter, you might say. I've recently eaten in all three, and the food is excellent.

Here is your guide to Denver's three brewpubs:

The Wynkoop Brewing Company (18th and Wynkoop Streets, 303/297-2700) is housed in a renovated warehouse across the street from Union Station in Lower Downtown (LoDo). It's Denver's first and has been packing them in for three years now. There are usually six or seven freshly brewed beers available from the old fashioned taps behind the bar, ranging from a light pilsener, through several ales and bitters, to a really creamy stout. My personal favorite is the St. Charles Pale Ale. There's also a "special of the day" which could be anything, depending upon the time of the year. Last week, they were serving a cherry ale which was anything but the pits. The Wynkoop is probably the most creative brewer of the three, and I've seen honey ale and strawberry lager on tap there. This place also has what undoubtedly is the most extensive collection of single malt scotch in town, just the thing to accompany an oatmeal stout on a wintry day. Yum.

The food tends toward classic "pub grub" and the menu features things like shepherd's pie, bangers and mash, and venison stew, along with some Colorado favorites like buffalo burgers and some Santa Fe style New Mexican plates. The crowd is definitely "Colorado", lots of hiking boots and jeans and real laid back. I've seen a large Malamute wearing sunglasses, sitting in a chair eating one of the Wynkoop's homemade bratwursts, while five people at the same table carried on a conversation over dinner.

OTHER NOTES: A great bar downstairs which features live jazz by national artists on weekends; interesting location in the LoDo area, close to McCormick's Fish House (with an incredible art deco long bar and another Irish-style bar, with Guinness and Harp on tap).

The Rock Bottom Brewery (Prudential Plaza at 16th and Curtis Streets, 303/534-7616), located right on the 16th Street Mall, the first pedestrian mall in the country, is surrounded by shopping, restaurants, and more bars. "The Rock" is the most upscale of the three, and you will see a lot of coats and ties, especially following happy hour during the week. It's a big lunch spot for the downtown office crowd and seems to be quite the meat market. During my last visit, there was more hitting going on than at a Holyfield fight. The well-heeled Yupster clientele enjoys a half dozen fresh brews, including "Red Rocks Red" (an Irish-style red ale), "Black Diamond Lager" (for the ski crowd), and "Subzero", a special light ale of the day "on loan" from The Rock's sister brewery up in Boulder. While the Wynkoop's brews were adventurous, The Rock features more classic British-style ales and Scottish "heavies." Rock Bottom has only been open for 10 weeks, but has already become a favorite; a really almost elegant (for a brewpub) decor and superb service. The food here is also a bit more upscale. The menu features appetizers like Thai empanadas and entrees which could be described as nouveau Southwest. I had blue corn chicken enchiladas; my sidekick had skewered barbecued pork loin. Everything was superb. Bring a shoehorn for happy hour.

OTHER NOTES: This place has the nicest gift shop of the three. You can buy t-shirts with logos of the house beers, a great souvenir from your Denver cultural tour. Don't leave Denver without a piece of The Rock. The location on the 16th Street Mall is also a big plus. A free bus travels the length of the mall and our hotel is near a stop, making the Rock Bottom well within staggering distance from home--and other brewpubs. Also on The Mall: Check out Duffy's Shamrock (classic watering hole), Mallory's (our most famous meat market) and the Paradise Cafe (sort of a cross between a 50's diner and the Star Wars bar scene).

Champion Brewing Company (1442 Larimer Square, 303/534-5444) is also relatively new and located in a great part of downtown: Larimer Square. The original buildings along this part of Larimer Street have all been renovated and it looks great. Champion is located in what used to be an old German restaurant (ironic, isn't it?) and has maintained some of the original internal structure, like the old rock walls. Apart from that, it's been completely redone and now has a "subterranean baseball" feel to it. The Champ is marketing itself as a sports brewpub, which sets it apart from the other two. The house beers include "Buck Wheat" (an authentic German style *weizenbier*), Larimer Lager, Stout Street Stout, and Coal Porter (you can almost chew this one). They also have specials, and if you are

undecided or want to try everything at once, order the sampler. For real cheap, you get a small glass of everything on tap. They arrange it from the lightest lager to the heaviest stout and explain everything. (They do this at the other two, as well.) When you then find the one you like, you can get it in a half-yard, or if you really don't care, a 52-ounce yard glass (the nearest thing to the old glass boot). For some reason, it's significantly cheaper to buy the full yard than the pitcher, which contains about the same. My theory is that it's worth the difference to the brewpub staff to be able to watch people pour beer all over themselves trying to drink a yard.

The menu here is awesome, and features "regional delicacies", supposedly favored by Dizzy Dean as he ate his way around America playing baseball. After a homemade sausage, rice and bean appetizer, we ate our way through babyback ribs and Jamaican jerk chicken. Travis, our favorite Texan, was so impressed with the spicy, beer-based barbeque sauce, he took some home on his shirt. They've got Cajun stuff, Colorado lamb ribs, deviled crab cakes, catfish filets, and real Rocky Mountain Oysters ("shaved and fried; the biggest we could find"). The crowd is more eclectic here, with great local talent, and this place is really comfortable. There's a little room you pass as you enter that looks like a laboratory, with vials and beakers all over, things steaming away, and all sorts of clipboards hanging on the walls. Actually, it is a lab: it's where the biermeister spends his time working to get ahead.

OTHER NOTES: You've got to see the industrial strength bathrooms. While you're in there, note the recordings of old Yankees World Series play by play, complete with ancient advertisements, over the sound system. On the way back to your bar stool, note the six pool tables and, yes, two professional foosball tables. Note the TV wall for sports events. Note the incredible scenery. And finally, note the great t-shirts at the end of the bar, one of which diagrams how they get the above-mentioned Rocky Mountain Oysters.

That's it. If this doesn't get you foaming at the mouth to head to Denver, you've been drinking too much light beer. Just remember, if you do show, that drinking anything at between five and six thousand feet is a little different, so pace yourself. For those who consider this unreasonable advice (and you know who you are), you can always grab a horse carriage back to the hotel. See you in June!

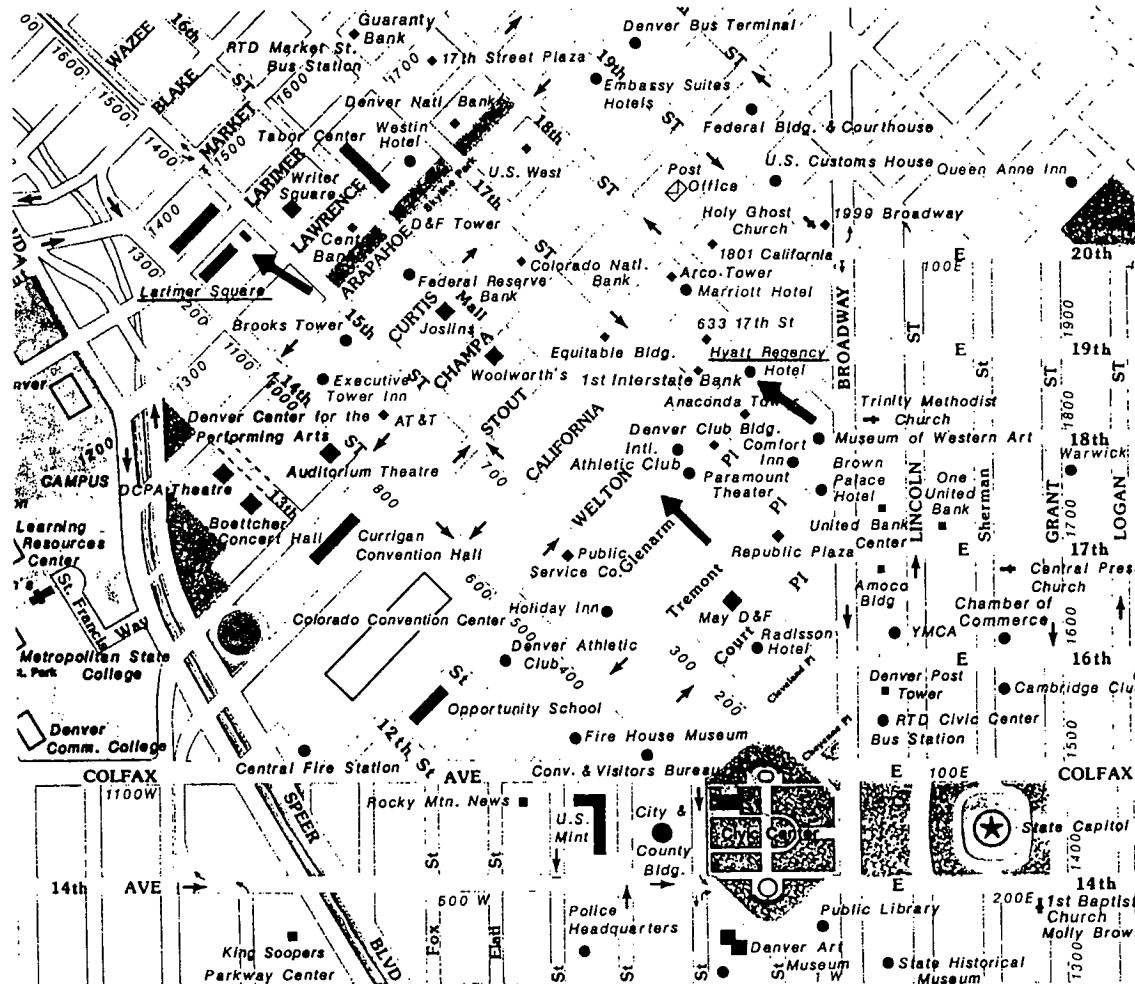
HOW TO GET THERE:

The 16th Street Mall has free shuttle buses that run its one-mile length (from Tremont Place to Lawrence) every 90 seconds.

WHAT TO EXPECT FROM DENVER'S WEATHER:

In June? Almost anything! Be sure to check your newspaper's weather listings for Denver a few days before your arrival. What we can tell you is that in June, our "normal" temperatures are a high of 80.5 degrees, and a low of 53 degrees. Of course, like almost any place, there are the occasions where our high temperature could exceed 90 degrees, or perhaps not make it above 50! Low humidity is what keeps Colorado so comfortable, and the fact that we're a mile high means the sun is a lot stronger. This helps keep you warmer on the coolest days, but beware of sunburn. The normal precipitation for the month of June is 1.42 inches. Almost invariably this will come in the form of afternoon cloudbursts that dissipate after sundown. Denver is predominantly mild and dry, enjoying 310 days of sunshine a year, and more hours of annual sun than San Diego or Miami Beach! Our annual precipitation is less than 15 inches per year.

Your best bet is to be prepared--bring a light jacket and a sweater, and a pair of long pants if you're planning to wear mostly shorts. No matter how warm it might get during the day, once the sun goes down, the temperature will sink to somewhere in the 50s.



Class of 1967:

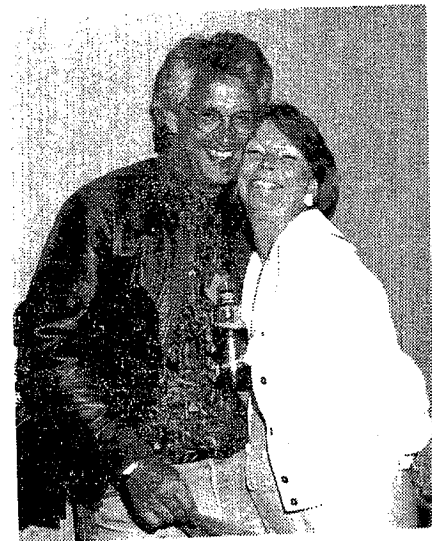

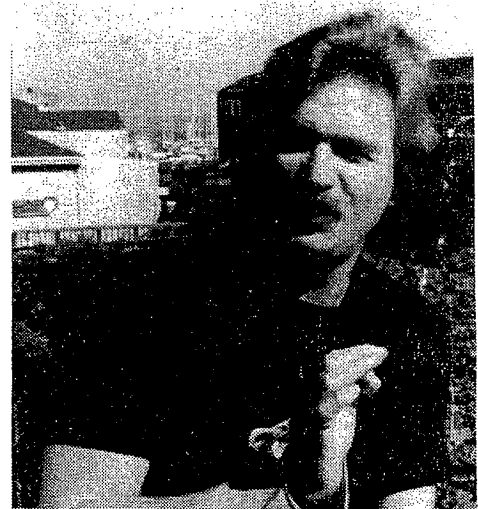
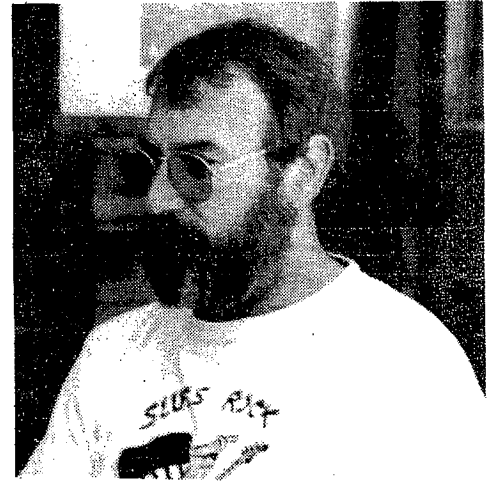
